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FIRST GIRLS FROM BOGA TO ATTEND HIGH SCHOOL

This year we are pleased to announce that two girls from Boga who are recipients of AAI scholarships are attending high school in the city of Shkoder. They are the first girls from Boga to stay away from home to go to high school. Traditionally, girls stayed home after the 8th or 9th grade until they entered into an arranged marriage. AAI is paying for their dorm room in a convent near the high school. The following are excerpts from interviews with these girls conducted by Angjelin Olaj, one of our university scholarship recipients:



DAFINA RAKAJ

Dafina is the second oldest child of Fran and Vera Rakaj. She has an older sister, a younger sister and two younger brothers.

Angjelini: How do you like living in the convent?


Dafina: Well, let's say everything is different from what we have expected before, it's great to be a student in Shkodra, we have many friends there and everything is going perfect.

Angjelini: Can you use a computer?

Dafina: Well, at the convent there is no computer for us to use, maybe we could use if we would have one.

Angjelini: Is the library good?

Dafina: Somehow, the environment is good enough to study, it's quiet, but I do not think that there are enough books.



REGJINA RAKAJ

Regjina is the youngest daughter of Gjok and Gjyste Rakaj. She has two older brothers who reside in Italy.

Angjelini: Do you help keep the convent clean? Are the nuns mean or nice?

Regjina: We need to wash the dishes and to clean our sleeping room. The nuns are very polite, we have good relations with them.

Angjelini: Is it working ok traveling back and forth to Boga?

Regjina: Yes, Marash guides us every Monday and Friday from the bus to school and vice versa.

Angjelini: Have you made friends with the other students?

Regjina: Yes we feel very good in the class, we have good friends.

Both girls are adjusting to the new experience of living away from their families as well as the difficulty of their classes. The village schools are not good and have not prepared them very well academically; however they are very grateful for the opportunity and are working very hard.

Of the other 26 AAI scholarship students, six more are in high school in Shkoder, two are attending the University of Shkoder, eleven are receiving help with bus fare to high school and seven young girls are receiving a small stipend with which to purchase books at the bookstore in town.
